INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION FOR PENAL RECONSTRUCTION AND DEVELOPMENT

In The Canadian Bar Review for March, 1942 the establishment in November 1941 of the International Commission for Penal Reconstruction and Development was announced. The first meeting of the Commission was held in the Council Room of the University of Cambridge on 27 February 1942, and was attended by the delegates of ten Allied Countries.* After the formal business of the Commission had been transacted three addresses on subjects of Criminal Science were presented, and the Commission paid the Cambridge Department of Criminal Science the compliment of entrusting it with the publication of these addresses, an honour which the Department has been glad to undertake.

It seems to us that it is in keeping with the spirit of international collaboration in which the Commission is acting that this material should be published in Canada, and we therefore wish once more to record our grateful acknowledgments to the Canadian Bar Association, and to the Editor of the Canadian Bar Review, whose generous hospitality makes this possible.
